Message from the Chief

I am pleased to present the 2018 Annual Report for the Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo Fire Departments. You will find pertinent details about our organization and the services we provided to the community throughout the year. It has been a privilege and honor to work alongside so many hard-working passionate fire service professionals. Maintaining excellent service to our communities and assisting the State in battling unprecedented fires is becoming the new standard way of doing business.

Our primary focus this past year was to complete the tasks required to commence operations as San Mateo Consolidated Fire Department. Our initial target of July 1, 2018 was delayed for six months because of challenges with being recognized as a new organization with CalPERS. In addition to that, State Assembly Bill 1912 posed a significant set-back until we were able to get it amended with the help of the League of Cities. Our hard work paid off and we were able to negotiate language that worked for all stakeholders. We spent the last four months of the year getting back on track and completing the work necessary to commence operations on January 13, 2019. Our members from all three departments accomplished the monumental task of blending three Memorandums of Understand (MOUs) into one document for the new agency. We also completed fire station lease agreements, asset transfer plans and obtained our own liability and workers compensation insurance.

I cannot stress enough how proud I am of our members that worked so hard throughout the year and never quit or accepted the status quo as the answer. We are the first JPA in the State of California in almost a decade and it is because of the willingness and tenacity of the members of this organization to fight to completion. I want to offer a special thanks to Foster City Human Resource Director Ann Ritzma and retired San Mateo Fire Chief Brian Kelly, who assisted us as a Specialist, both contributed an unbelievable amount of time and effort towards this project. The City Councils of all three Cities passed resolutions to commence operations as the San Mateo Consolidated Fire Department. The continued standardization of best practices will allow our new fire service organization to provide integrated response services to all three communities in a more cost effective and sustainable manner, while maintaining and improving the existing level of service within each community.

Safety remains our organization's top priority. We have continued to implement best practices on reducing exposure to cancer causing toxins and have devoted a great deal of time focusing on improving behavioral health needs of all our members. Each year the number of our emergency responses increase, with 2018 being no different. We continued to maintain a 95% compliance in meeting the County response time standard.

We reorganized our Command Staff, creating a full-time Training Battalion Chief, a Deputy Chief position for Community Risk Reduction, and a Clinical Education Specialist, who is assigned to our Central San Mateo County Training Division. We continued to maintain a modern fleet, taking delivery of three more Pierce Engines and one more Seagrave Engine. We also took delivery of a new hose and light unit provided by San Mateo County OES as a replacement of our 1987 Hose Wagon. We also amended the FACT Charter to meet the needs going forward as part of SMC.

WLC Architects completed construction documents for a new Fire Station 25 to be located on the corner of Shafter and Borel, two blocks from the existing Fire Station 25. We did experience some lengthy approval process requirements and now hope to break ground on this project in the summer of 2019. We have also started work on the replacement of Fire Station 15 and are exploring location possibilities to locate a modern functional facility.

On behalf of all the fire department members, I want to wish you a safe and happy 2019.

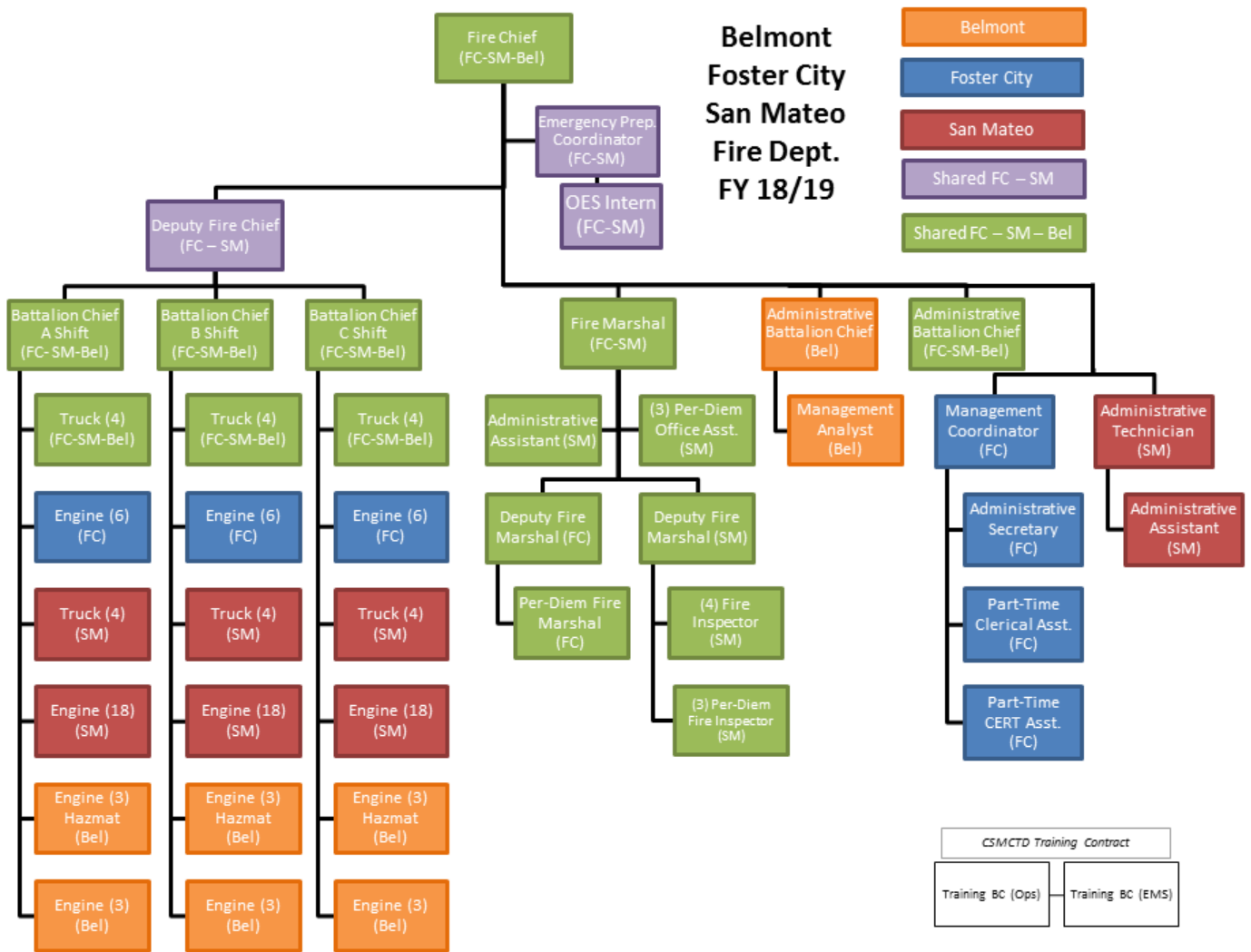

Firefighter Jackson Shales (Belmont)

Jackson grew up in Foster City and attended Serra High School in San Mateo. Jackson was an Explorer with Post 955 through the San Mateo County Fire Department. After high school Jackson attended CSM and NCTI in Roseville where he obtained his Paramedic License. Jackson has previously worked for AMR in Sacramento/Yolo/Placer County. Jackson has most recently worked as an accredited Paramedic in San Mateo County and was a Cadet with our Fire Department.

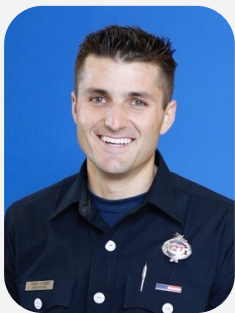
Office Assistant II Kacey Treadway (San Mateo) 8/13/18

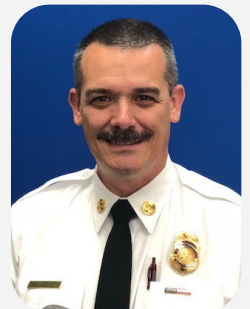

Firefighter/Paramedic Ken Will to Fire Captain (San Mateo)

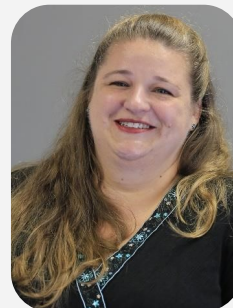

Fire Captain Robert Cook to Training Battalion Chief (San Mateo)

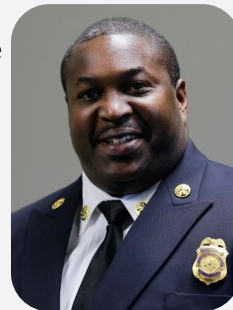

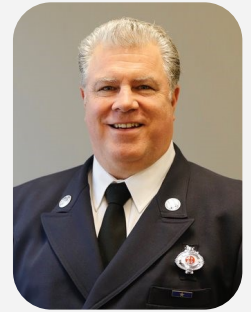

Firefighter Robert Davis (San Mateo)

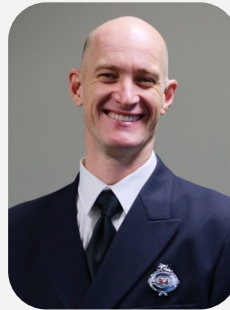

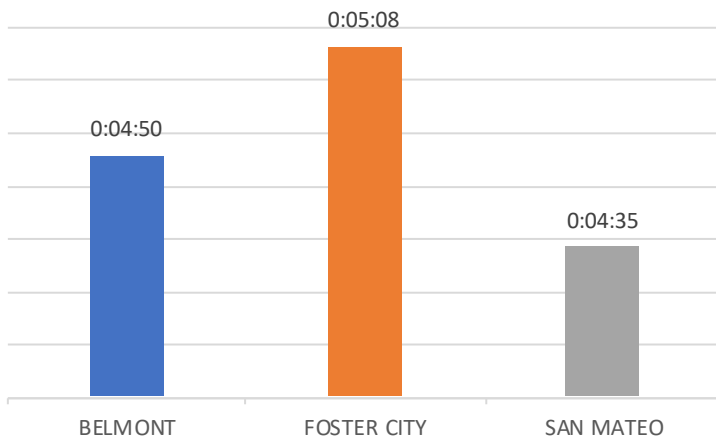

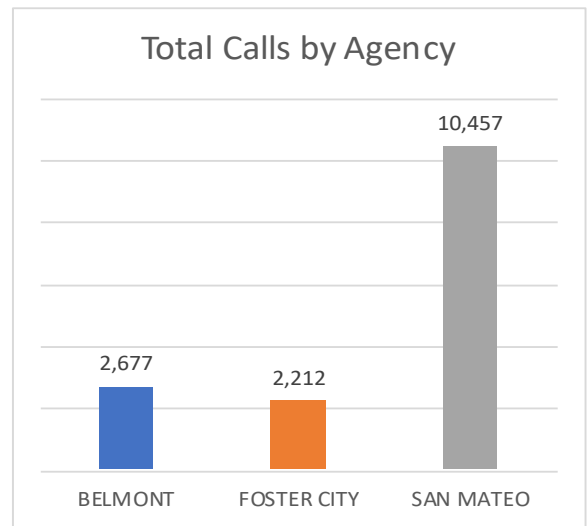

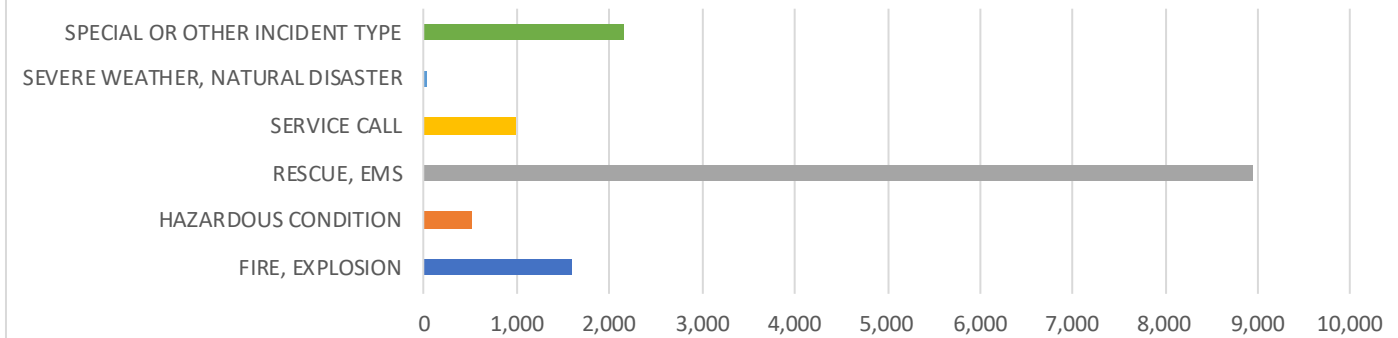
Average Response Time by Agency (only includes: Priority 1 & First In)



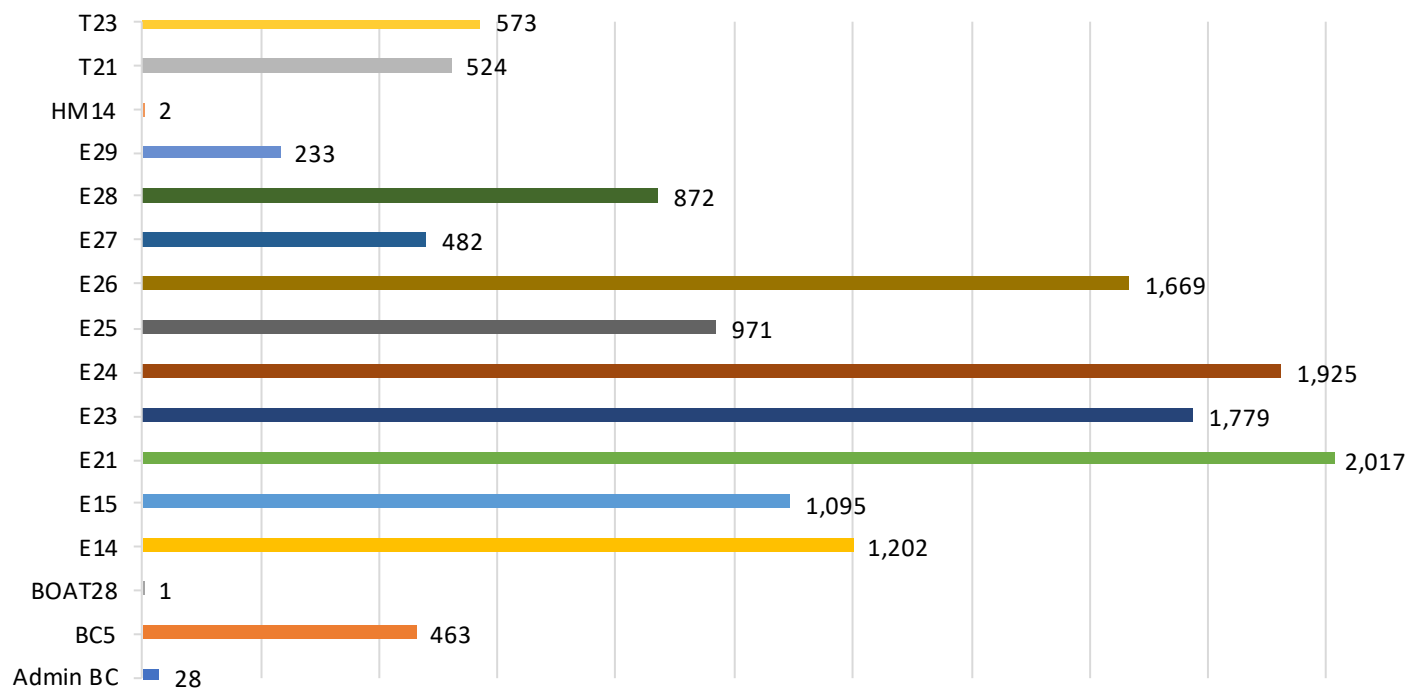
Total Calls by Agency

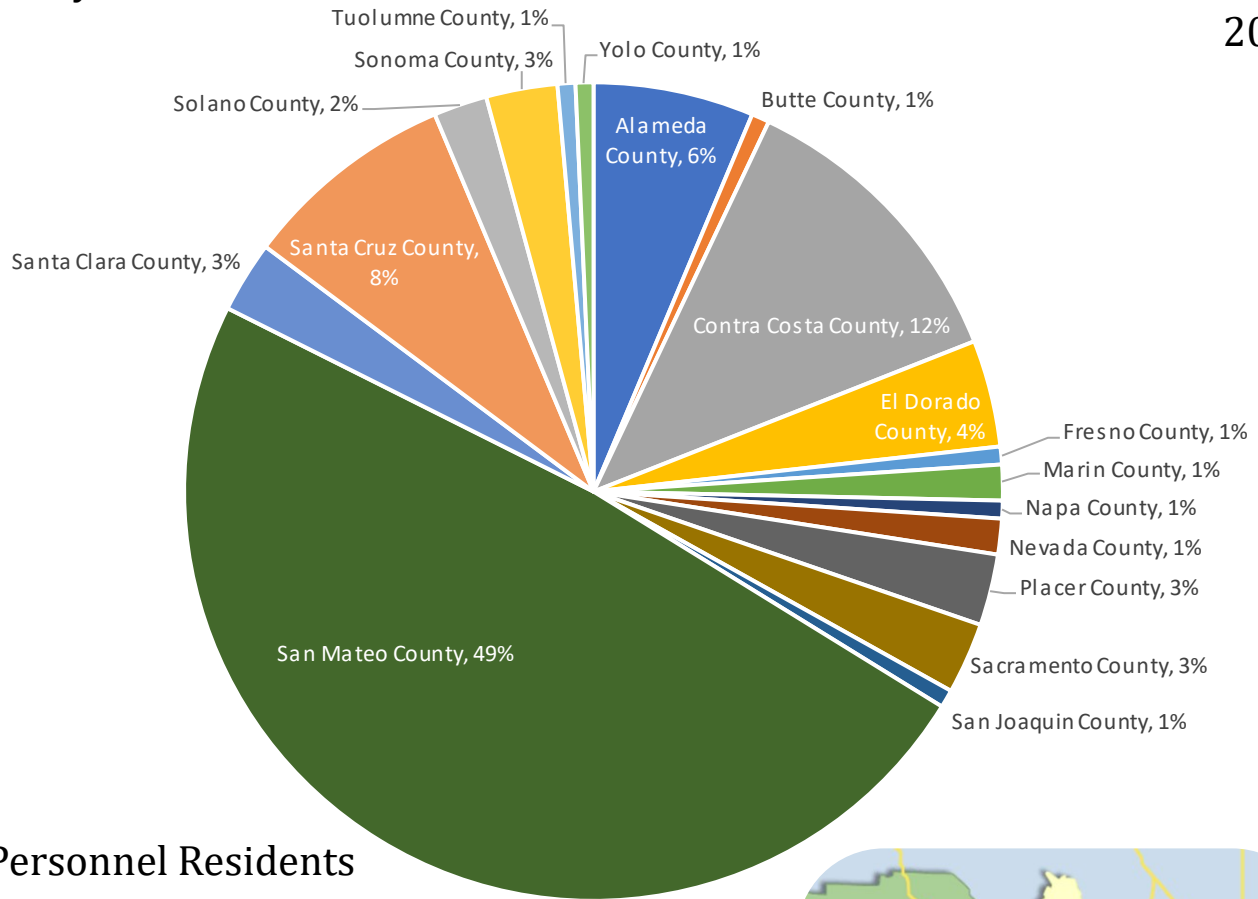

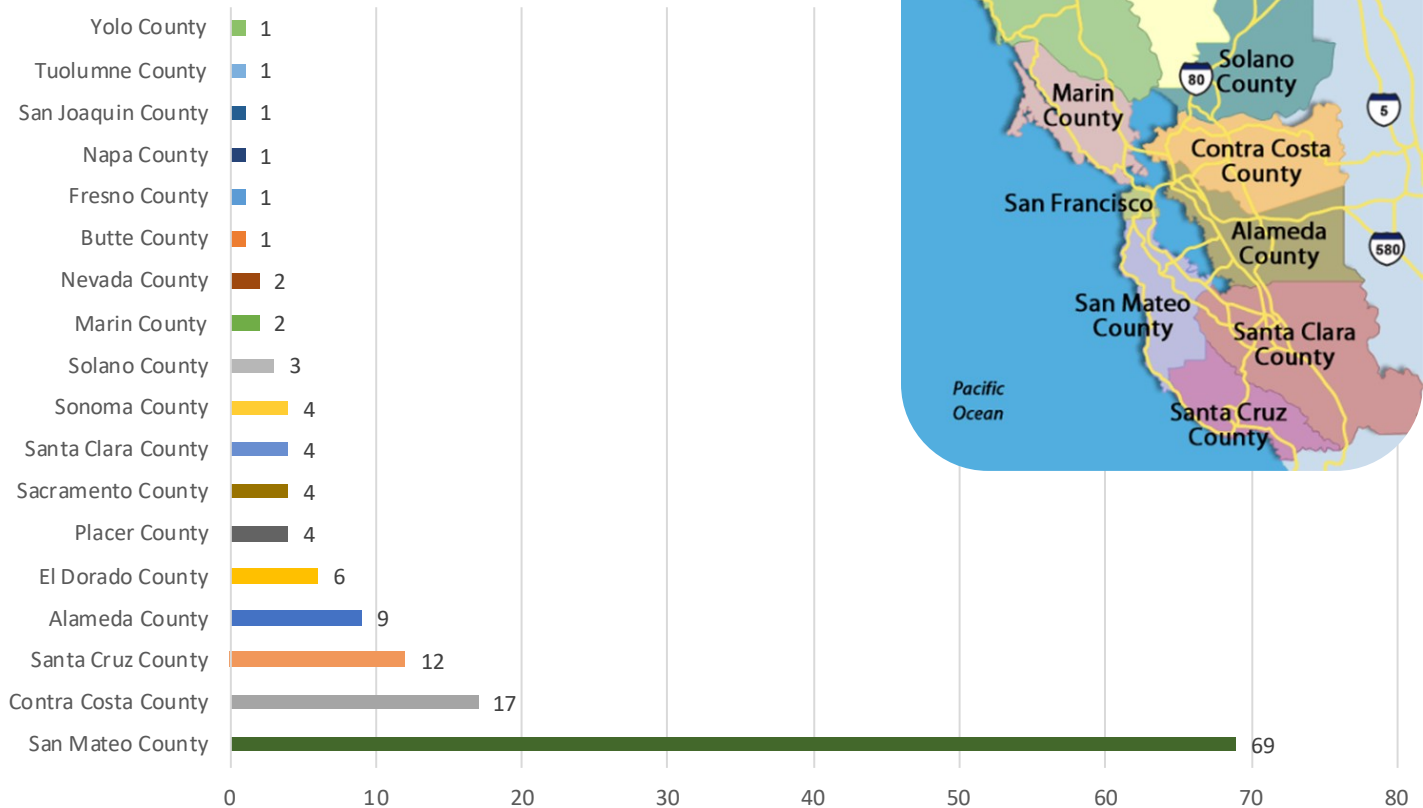

Office of Emergency Services

Belmont | Foster City | San Mateo

In 2018, the Office of Emergency Services continued to broaden emergency preparedness by consistently interacting with the community, city departments, and local, regional and state agencies. In August, OES Office Assistant II, Kacey Treadway, joined the team and supports the development of emergency plans and procedures, maintains training records and plans, and develops training and exercise materials for use by city staff. OES proudly accepted City Council Proclamations in Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo in honor of National Emergency Preparedness Month in September 2018. In October, OES worked with the members of the Fire Department Command Staff and Suppression staff to submit Assistance to Firefighters Grant funding proposals totaling over \$400,000 for a shared Type 6 Wildland Fire Engine, personal protective equipment for our three city Fire Cadet Program, and personal protective equipment for Foster City's water rescue team. OES also pursued a \$250,000 Wildland Urban Interface Mitigation and Enforcement Program grant project through FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP).



Planning Efforts

All Foster City and San Mateo departments designated staff to work on the development of a Continuity of Operations/Continuity of Government Plan throughout 2018. The goal of "continuity planning" is to ensure that each city can deliver essential functions and services to the community, while minimizing the impact of a disruption. This planning effort culminated in the delivery of 4 training workshops attended by 136 city staff in November, and 2 table top exercises attended by 68 city staff in December.

At Foster City City Council's request, OES researched and prepared a staff report titled "Potential Disaster Impacts to the General Fund Reserve" and delivered this report on March 26, 2018 during a City Council Study Session.

In May, OES attended a stakeholder meeting convened by San Mateo County Sea Change to learn about ongoing regional initiatives addressing sea level rise and determine impacts to San Mateo and Foster City's Local Hazard Mitigation Plans. OES helped in the development of the Belmont Creek Flood Management Plan in coordination with Belmont Public Works, and on the development of the San Mateo County Flood Warning System with allied agencies throughout San Mateo County.

Training and Exercise

In San Mateo, OES continues to present information related to Disaster Service Worker status at San Mateo's quarterly New Hire Orientation and distributed backpacks and disaster preparedness information to 66 newly hired merit employees. In 2018, OES worked with all city departments to ensure compliance with the National Incident Management System training requirements, and training certificates were obtained by 163 staff members from Foster City and San Mateo. During September's National Emergency Preparedness Month, OES organized 2 "Get Ready" Disaster Preparedness classes attended by 16 San Mateo and Foster City Staff.



In August, the American Red Cross delivered 2 Shelter Operations courses attended by 23 Belmont and Foster City Parks and Recreation staff and members of the CERT community to prepare for the annual Bay Area Urban Area Security Initiative (BAUASI) Yellow Command Regional Exercise. In June, OES facilitated 2 emergency communications and public information modules during a week-long multi-agency "Active Shooter in School Setting" exercise.

On September 6, 2018, Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo participated in the Yellow Command Regional Exercise. The exercise was in two parts, an Emergency Operations Center activation and the second part was an activation of an emergency shelter. These were staffed by members of Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo, along with partners from the American Red Cross and members of each city's CERT. Additionally, the Peninsula Humane Society set up a mock emergency animal shelter and tested its emergency animal shelter capability. Lessons learned from the exercises will be used to develop future trainings and improve emergency planning efforts.

Collaborations

In May of 2018, OES presented to the Mid-Peninsula Communicators group regarding emergency alert and notification systems. In September, OES was invited to evaluate a CalWater EOC exercise and San Francisco Airport's Annual EOC Exercise.

OES continues to engage with the community on matters of emergency preparedness, including the Bay Area Urban Areas Security Initiative, through both the San Mateo City Services Academy and Leadership Academy, community groups such as commercial property managers, neighborhood associations and others. OES was present at many community events throughout the year to provide preparedness information and to answer questions about community preparedness. These events included National Night Out (8/7/18),

Visa Preparathon (8/28/18), and Foster City Fire Department Open House (10/6/18). Throughout the month of September, OES collected San Mateo and Foster City community feedback about through its Annual National Emergency Preparedness Month survey and provided preparedness tips on the city's website and through social media.

In anticipation of wildland fire season, OES continuously worked with Belmont residents on wildland fire preparedness and mitigation measures, delivered presentations to Belmont City Council and responded to inquiries made by engaged community members through the Belmont City Manager Weekly Update Newsletters.

OES, the San Mateo Fire Prevention Bureau, Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo CERT, and Fire Cadets partnered with the American Red Cross Home Fire Preparedness Campaign for the third year in a row to deliver a record-setting smoke alarm installation event held on October 27, 2018. The installations took place in Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo. This partnership reached 63 households comprised of 141 residents, and 277 smoke alarms were installed. Since the beginning of the partnership in 2016, 894 smoke detectors have been installed in 247 homes.

OES Responds

In April, OES responded to the Woodlake Condominium Community for a fire that displaced 36 households. In partnership with the American Red Cross, an emergency shelter was open and operated for two days to provide food, shelter and other needs for the displaced residents. The American Red Cross and 40 of its volunteers provided an estimated \$10,000 in financial assistance to 48 individuals to recover from their loss over a period of three and a half months.

In Foster City, OES partially activated its Emergency Operations Center to provide support to the annual Independence Day Fireworks show where they utilized an SMCAAlert notification group for event alerts and reminders.

Maintaining Skills, Knowledge, and Professionalism

Due to the unfortunate frequency of disasters throughout California and across the nation, emergency management best practices are constantly changing. As communities respond to, and recover from, disasters, many lessons are learned, and new plans and processes are identified so that future emergencies can be managed with better outcomes. Because of this constantly changing environment, OES has participated in many workshops, seminars, and conferences to meet with emergency managers who have been on the front lines, and to learn from their experiences.

Some of the major topic areas that OES pursued this year include: public alerts and warnings, the role of voluntary organizations in emergency response plans, the role of private sector in emergency response plans, best practices in emergency sheltering that support needs of medically fragile evacuees, new protocols for turning off power during red flag weather events to minimize the risk of wildfire ignition, and best practices from California's emergency management community.

OES Emergency Preparedness Coordinator, Jenelle Masterson, earned national recognitions this year: the Certified Emergency Manager (CEM) credential, the highest honor of professional achievement available from the International Association of Emergency Managers. She also graduated from FEMA's National Emergency Management Advanced Academy on June 29, 2018. The rigorous curriculum focused on program management and oversight, effective communication, integrated collaboration, and strategic thinking, along with the completion of a research project.



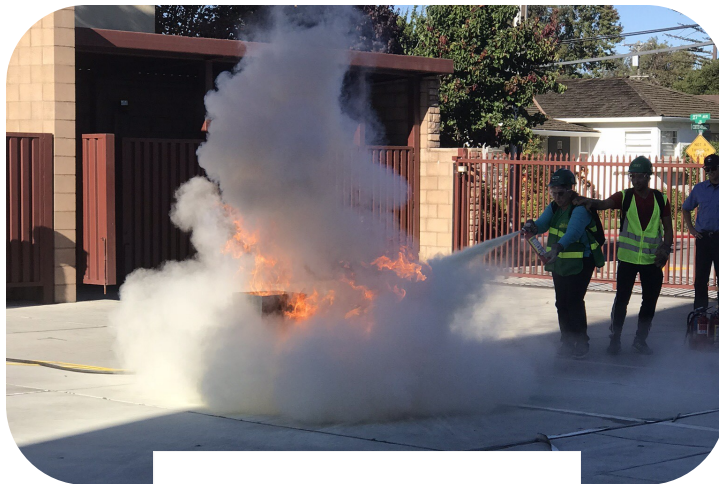
Community Emergency Response Team



Program Highlights

The CERT program has been a continuing success with residents of the cities of Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo. Since the first class was offered in 2004, almost 2500 residents have been trained in emergency preparedness and response, and have become part of their city-wide Emergency Response Team program. In addition, the program is now being offered to City employees who will be better prepared both at home and at City Hall if an emergency strikes.

This year, CERT Volunteers assisted in teaching a CERT class to the staff/faculty of Norte Dame de Namur University, a Business CERT class to employees of Gilead Sciences and Visa Corporation in Foster City, and classes for the general public in Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo. The current roster of active CERT members includes doctors, nurses and ham radio specialists. This year the team was proud to present over 68 continuing education classes or training events to these members. CERT volunteers also assisted with a number of public events including Carlmont High School's Sober Prom anti-DUI event, a 5k/10k Fun Run, San Mateo County's annual Disaster Preparedness Day and the County Health Department's Green Dawn disaster exercise; a large activity booth at Foster City's CityFest event, four Skills Day events and three full-scale neighborhood Activation Drills. In October, CERT assisted the Red Cross with the installation of 277 smoke detectors in the homes of Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo.

Cadet Program

The Cadet program is a year long work experience program for young adults in conjunction with the San Mateo Community College's Cooperative Education Program. The program fulfills the volunteer hour requirement for students to earn their California State Firefighter I Certificate. Those hours include a minimum of 48 hour a month of ride-along experience and 50 hours a year of either: Fire Administration, Fire Prevention Bureau, or Fire Training Division duties. Fire Cadets ride-along as student firefighters with Engine and Truck companies of the Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo Fire Departments. In addition to ride-along experiences and administrative duties, the Cadets volunteer for numerous Fire Department events throughout the year.

Explorer Post 904

Explorer Post 904 is a program that allows young adults ages 15-21 to explore the career of firefighting, rescue and emergency medical services. 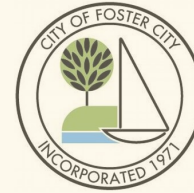

Bureau of Fire Protection & Life Safety

Mission

The Bureau is responsible for the management and enforcement of all City fire and life safety codes. Fire Prevention conducts meetings, reviews building plans to ensure proposed designs meet current State, National and local fire codes and local ordinance requirements and inspects occupancies during the various stages of construction. The inspections include but are not limited to; fire sprinkler systems, fire alarm systems, hazardous material handling, use and storage, additionally, verify that all life safety systems are provided and are adequately maintained.



Major 2018 Projects/Accomplishments:

Belmont

Completed construction

- 710 Island Parkway – Autobahn – Mercedes lounge area for customer to wait while their cars are being serviced. Cars are dropped off for service and transported across the street.
- 1001 Old County Road – Gas Station and Car Wash. Gas Station has unleaded and diesel gasoline.

Under construction

- 1201 Shoreway – Hampton Inn and Suite – 96 hotel rooms with parking on the first floor. Had been targeted to be completed by the end of 2018 but hopefully will finish in 2019.
- 600 El Camino Real – Apartment/Condominium units above parking. Original plan was for condominiums but there is discussion onsite that it will be apartments. Should be completed early part of 2019.
- 400 El Camino Real – This mixed-use (residential/commercial) project includes a four story 73-unit residential condominium building and a stand-alone 4,909 square foot single story commercial building; the residential units range from one to three-bedrooms in size. An underground garage (138 spaces) will serve the residential units, The project includes outdoor patio areas, common area open space, as well as a fitness center. The residential units are hoping to be completed by the end of 2018.
- Merry Moppet Preschool at 2200 Carlmont Drive is replacing an existing building with a 12,000+ square foot classroom building expanding the capacity of the school.
- 400 El Camino Real – Condominium units with underground parking. Also, onsite there will be a commercial business (still unknown tenant). Condo building should be completed in middle of 2018.



Foster City

Completed construction

- Illumina – 200-500 Lincoln Center – This campus currently has two five-story lab and research buildings, an amenity building and parking garage. A high-rise lab and additional parking garages are in the master plan but have not been started.
- The first-floor commercial tenants at Atria Assisted Living (Thayer & Civic Center Ln) are occupying the spaces. The U.S. Post Office will be open very soon due to the closure of the Post Office on Shell earlier this year.
- Alma Point commercial tenants who are now open include: Happy Lemon, Starbucks, Falafel Tazah and Pastries & Chaat with Bento House due to open soon.
- The Triton at 55 Triton Park Lane is a 5-story apartment building with 220 – 1, 2 and 3 bedrooms units currently at 68% occupancy. They have many amenities including pool, spa, fitness center and much more including an attached parking garage. Retail spaces on the first floor are still to be leased.
- Zoox at 1149 Chess Dr completed their renovation of an existing warehouse. Zoox is committed to creating sustainable mobility in the self-driving auto industry.
- Starbird Restaurant opened where the former Pizza Hut was on Triton and serves 'positively delicious chicken'.
- Dozo Izakaya at 3 Plaza View Ln is open and serving Japanese food and Sushi.

Foster City

Under construction

- 357 Lakeside – Gilead is nearing occupancy for the 5-story research and development lab building.
- 324 Lakeside is another Gilead lab building nearing completion. The 4-story building will have occupancy in 2018 and the parking garage is breaking ground.
- Plans are being reviewed for Waverly Cove located at the end of Triton Drive next to The Triton apartments. This project includes 5 3-story buildings containing 4 townhomes each on a very tight piece of property. The final requirements are being ironed out and groundbreaking probably starting as we write.
- Triton Phase III is still in the planning stage with plans to be submitted very soon. This will include 22 workforce apartments and 70 townhomes on 4.75 acres at Triton & Pilgrim.
- Foster Square Condominiums are still in construction with several of the 14 buildings occupied. These are 4 story buildings with large 2-story condos averaging 8-12 units per building. Construction has begun on all the buildings.



San Mateo

Completed construction

- Hillsdale Mall food court – tenants include Panda Express, Haagen Daaz, Sarku Japan, Uncle Tetsu, Tacos El Grullense and Midici that are currently open.
- Station Park Green (Delaware & Concar) The first of the four apartment buildings is completed and units are being leased. The retail spaces on the first floor are awaiting tenants.
- CalWater building has a beautiful new building at their existing site at 341 N. Delaware Street.
- 220 N. Bayshore – 42 new Townhomes have sold out and are occupied.
- 521 E. 5th Ave was completed and is currently awaiting a tenant at this corner, 1-story building.

- Hillsdale Mall – 5 buildings comprise the new north end of the mall.
- 31 9th Ave – Mixed use commercial & residential. Basement is completed and wood framing going up at El Camino & 9th Ave.
- 405 E 4th – 4-story office building with residential on the top floor.
- 333 S. B St – Remodel of a 3-story building in downtown.
- 520 El Camino Real – 9-story business building. Complete restoration of interior. Building mostly gutted and the renovations to begin soon.
- Station Park Green- The 2nd and 3rd buildings are expected to be completed summer/Fall 2019 with the 4th building to break ground in 2019.
- Bay Meadows – 2850 S. Delaware – 4-story office building; Tenant improvements to begin soon with Guidewire to be the master tenant.
- 930 & 950 Park Place is part of the Franklin Templeton complex and is adding two 4-story office buildings
- 2883 S. Norfolk is an existing Senior living facility- Atria Hillsdale- who have demolished the front building to rebuild a new dementia unit and remodel of the existing building.
